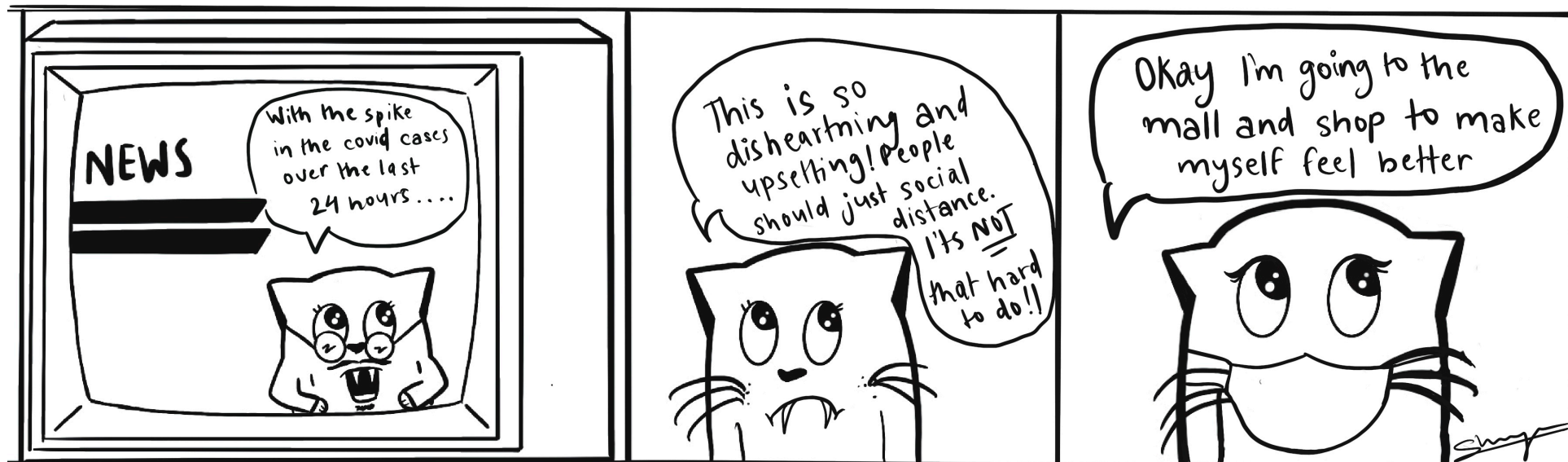

Three bills are being protested against, 'The farmers produce trade and commerce (promotion and facilitation) bill', 'The farmers (empowerment and protection) agreement on price assurance and farm services bill' and 'The essential commodities (amendment) bill'. Instead of tightening the rules around the sale, price, and storage, the opposite has occurred and farmers are to face only loss. The helm has been handed over to large corporations which will likely result in the neglect of the farmers' opinion. Even after the government has provided the farmers the liberty of choosing their primary consumers, however, due to the lack of storage facilities, the farmers are unsure about the time period for which their produce can be stored, compelling them to sell their produce at unsustainable prices. For years on end, India has heard of farmers committing suicides when they go into debt due to crop failures, these bills would worsen the situation. India has always proudly chanted the slogan 'Jai Jawaan, Jai Kisaan' and now when our farmers need our help, we are turning our backs on them. The protest was meant to be peaceful but instead, they were hit by tear gas, powerful water jets and stones. The army was deployed to strengthen security as well, due to the enormous amount of people that joined the protest. The farmers, however, did not relent and marched forward to get the rights they deserve. Many Punjabi celebrities too joined the protest to show their support. Some farmers were jailed for protesting and some got hit by the water jets during the cold winters of Delhi, the same water that could have helped these farmers who suffer the most, every year, by India's nation wide water crisis. The farmers brought 'ration' worth six months, their spirit surely lets people know how serious this is for them and they are not doing this without reason. The elderly farmers slept on the cold floors as well, as they waited for the government to pay heed to them.
